Research Roundup

I am extremely pleased to tell you that the first three studies discussed below were funded in part by grants from SFA.

The first study “Epigenetic Control of Translation Checkpoint and Tumor Progression via RUVBL1-EEF1A1 Axis” identifies a protein that could be a potential new drug target in Ewing sarcoma. The investigators show that decreasing levels of this protein, which is involved in epigenetic pathways that can help control which genes are expressed, and an inhibiting another important protein, decreases the rate at which cancer cells grow in the lab. This is an early study, but it indicates that this is a possible combination therapy in Ewing sarcoma.

[“The M6A Reader YTHDC1 and the RNA Helicase DDX5 Control the Production of Rhabdomyosarcoma-Enriched circRNAs”](#) investigates how a new biologically active class of RNA (circRNA) impacts the creation of tumors in rhabdomyosarcoma. They identify a pathway where the creation of circRNAs relies on the interaction between a protein called YTHDC1 and the RNA helicase (DDX5). This study indicates that the decrease of YTHDC1/DDX5 reduces cell growth and that they may act in the initiation of rhabdomyosarcoma tumors. Future work must be done to determine how they correlate with tumor onset and progression; however, the inhibition of the pathway could become an interesting therapeutic approach.

The next study [“Structurally Complex Osteosarcoma Genomes Exhibit Limited Heterogeneity within Individual Tumors Across Evolutionary Time”](#) looked at osteosarcoma, which is an aggressive cancer with a high chromosomal complexity meaning that there are large parts of the genome that are either deleted or copied. There are different hypotheses as to how this occurs, and this study further examined whether the complexity comes from constant evolution of chromosomal mutations or from early multiple mutations followed by stable maintenance of an abnormal genome. These investigators sequenced over 12,000 individual tumor cells from different patients at diagnosis and upon relapse. The data indicate that the latter may be the case. These results have implications for diagnosis, biomarker assessment, and mechanisms of resistance.

Lastly, I want to highlight a phase 3 trial for a new drug to treat Desmoid tumors, [Nirogacestat, a Gamma-Secretase Inhibitor for Desmoid Tumor](#). This study found that Nirogacestat was associated with better outcomes as measured by multiple criteria in adults with progressing desmoid tumors with mostly low-grade adverse events.

Clinical Trial Participation in Sarcoma

A strategic focus for SFA is clinical trial support and participation. We often receive questions from patients and family members about clinical trial participation and options. This has led us to develop programs and initiatives to better support patients.

In response to this need, we created a [page](#) on the SFA website for clinical trial listings. While the list is by no means exhaustive currently, our goal is to grow this page, provide an updated trial matching site, and relieve the burden of clinicaltrials.gov.

Last year, we launched SFA’s [Jordan’s Dream Fund](#) for clinical trial participation. This fund provides up to \$5,000 to patients participating in clinical trials who need assistance with travel, accommodations, and other expenses associated with clinical trial participation.

In July, during Sarcoma Awareness Month SFA will host a session on clinical trial participation, when to start talking about trials, and how to engage in shared decision making with your medical provider when evaluating a trial.

SFA works to grow awareness about the sarcoma trials available to patients through industry partners. We provide information about clinical trials through our social media platforms, and we will begin to include information in our monthly Sarcoma Spotlight newsletter.

We partner with sarcoma researchers and industry to find more and better therapies for sarcoma patients. We also work to advocate for and develop programs in collaboration with our strategic partners to overcome barriers to participation in clinical trials. To that end, SFA is interested in learning about patient experiences related to clinical trials.

That's why we are asking patients, survivors, and caregivers to participate in this [Clinical Trials in Sarcoma survey](#). The purpose of this survey is to identify barriers to and facilitators of clinical trial participation. We would like to [hear from you](#) so we can better understand how we can help to relieve some of these barriers and better support patients on their sarcoma journey.
